Dear Board Members:

We are pleased to submit this Actuarial Valuation and Review as of July 1, 2025 for the City of Atlanta Police Officers' Pension Fund (Fund). It summarizes the actuarial data used in the valuation, analyzes the preceding year's experience, and establishes the funding requirements for fiscal year ending June 30, 2027.

This report has been prepared in accordance with generally accepted actuarial principles and practices for the exclusive use and benefit of the Board, based upon information provided by Strategic Benefits Advisors and financial information provided by Mauldin & Jenkins.

Segal does not audit the data provided. The accuracy and comprehensiveness of the data is the responsibility of those supplying the data. To the extent we can, however, Segal does review the data for reasonableness and consistency. Based on our review of the data, we have no reason to doubt the substantial accuracy of the information on which we have based this report and we have no reason to believe there are facts or circumstances that would affect the validity of these results.

The measurements shown in this actuarial valuation may not be applicable for other purposes. Future actuarial measurements may differ significantly from the current measurements presented in this report due to such factors as the following: plan experience differing from that anticipated by the economic or demographic assumptions; increases or decreases expected as part of the natural operation of the methodology used for these measurements (such as the end of an amortization period); changes in economic or demographic assumptions; and changes in plan provisions or applicable law.

The actuarial calculations were directed under the supervision of Jeanette R. Cooper. We are members of the American Academy of Actuaries and we meet the Qualification Standards of the American Academy of Actuaries to render the actuarial opinion herein. To the best of our knowledge, the information supplied in this actuarial valuation is complete and accurate, except as noted in Section 4.

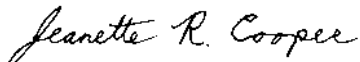

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Section 1: Actuarial Valuation Summary

Purpose and basis

This report has been prepared by Segal to present a valuation of the City of Atlanta Police Officers' Pension Fund as of July 1, 2025. The valuation was performed to determine whether the assets and contributions are sufficient to provide the prescribed benefits.

The contribution requirements presented in this report are based on:

- The benefit provisions of the Fund, as administered by the Board;
- The characteristics of covered active participants, inactive vested participants, and retired participants and beneficiaries as of June 30, 2025, provided by Strategic Benefits Advisors;
- The assets of the Fund as of June 30, 2025, provided by Mauldin & Jenkins;
- Economic assumptions regarding future salary increases and investment earnings;
- Other actuarial assumptions regarding employee terminations, retirement, death, etc. and
- The funding policy adopted by the City.

Certain disclosure information required by GASB Statements No. 67 and 68 as of June 30, 2026 and June 30, 2025 for the Fund is provided in separate reports.

Valuation highlights

Developments since last valuation

- **Asset returns:** The rate of return on the market value of assets was 11.02% for the year ending June 30, 2025. Effective July 1, 2025, the actuarial value of assets was reset to market value. Without the reset, the effective return on the actuarial value of assets, a notional value which smooths investment gains and losses over five years, was 8.97%. This resulted in an actuarial gain when measured against the assumed rate of return of 7.00%. This actuarial investment gain decreased the employer contribution rate by 1.83% of pay while the reset to market value further decreased the employer contribution rate by 1.99%. We advise the Board to continue to monitor actual and anticipated investment returns relative to the assumed long-term rate of return on investments of 7.00%.
- **Contributions:** Actual contributions made during the year ending June 30, 2025 of \$48,494,000 were 100% of the actuarially determined contribution. In the prior year, actual contributions of \$44,299,000 were 100% of the prior year ADC.
- **Experience:** The actuarial gain of \$6,524,971, or 0.3% of actuarial accrued liability, prior to any plan or assumption changes, is due to an investment gain of \$28,881,653, or 1.5% of actuarial accrued liability, and a loss from sources other than investments of \$22,356,682, or 1.2% of the actuarial accrued liability prior to reflection of assumption changes. This demographic loss is primarily due to new entrants, salary increases higher than anticipated for active participants, and cost-of-living adjustments higher than anticipated for participants and their beneficiaries in pay status who were hired prior to September 1, 2011.
- **Assumption changes:** The following actuarial assumptions and methods were approved by the Board on January 21, 2026, and changed with this valuation, following the completion of an experience study for the five-year period ending June 30, 2024:
 - Administrative expenses
 - Salary increases
 - Cost-of-living adjustment (COLA) increases
 - Inflation
 - Payroll growth
 - Mortality tables and mortality improvement scales
 - Disability rates
 - Withdrawal rates
 - Retirement rates
 - Percentage of terminated vested participants electing refunds

- Reset of actuarial value of assets to mark value with continuation of recognition of gains and losses over five years recommencing with the July 1, 2026 valuation.

As a result of these changes, the employer normal cost decreased by \$1.92 million and the actuarial accrued liability increased by \$129.25 million. The total impact was an increase in the ADC of \$5.42 million, or 3.33% of projected payroll. Details of the changes are described in Section 4, Exhibit G.

- **Plan provisions:** There have been no changes in plan provisions since the last valuation.

Actuarial valuation results

- **Funded ratio:** The funded ratio (the ratio of the actuarial value of assets to actuarial accrued liability) is 78.32%, compared to the prior year funded ratio of 80.23%. This ratio is one measure of funding status, and its history is a measure of funding progress. Using the market value of assets, the funded ratio is 78.32%, compared to 80.34% as of the prior valuation date. The decrease in the funded ratios is mainly due to the impact of the new assumptions partially offset by resetting the actuarial value of assets to market value. These measurements are not necessarily appropriate for assessing the sufficiency of the plan assets to cover the estimated cost of settling the Fund's benefit obligation or the need for or the amount of future contributions.
- **Actuarially determined contribution (ADC):** The ADC for the upcoming year is \$55,091,884, an increase of \$7,927,317 from the prior valuation. The contribution as a percentage of projected payroll increased from 34.19% of projected payroll to 35.27% of projected payroll, based on a 16-year level percent-of-payroll amortization of the unfunded actuarial accrued liability.
- **Unfunded actuarial accrued liability (UAAL):** The UAAL (the excess of the actuarial accrued liability over the actuarial value of assets) is \$446,943,092 which is an increase of \$82,209,579 since the prior valuation.

Funding considerations

- **Minimum funding standards:** The July 1, 2025 valuation is used to determine the ADC for the fiscal year July 1, 2026 to June 30, 2027. The ADC is adjusted for interest to the middle of the fiscal period and satisfies the minimum funding standards under Georgia law Code Section 47-20-10.
- **Funding method:** Segal strongly recommends an actuarial funding method that targets 100% funding of the actuarial accrued liability. Generally, this implies payments that are ultimately at least enough to cover normal cost, interest on the UAAL and the principal balance. The funding policy adopted by the Board meets this standard. The Fund receives 11.75% of base salary for employees hired after August 31, 2011 and Hybrid Participants, and 12% or 13% of base salary for employees hired before September 1, 2011. The City contributes the ADC, which is net of employee contributions. The ADC is comprised of the employer normal cost, including administrative expenses, and a payment to amortize the Unfunded Actuarial Accrued Liability (UAAL) over 16 years. The amortization payment is calculated using a level percentage of payroll method where payroll is assumed to increase 3.50% annually.

Risk

- **Snapshot date:** It is important to note that this actuarial valuation is based on plan assets as of June 30, 2025. The Fund's funded status does not reflect short-term economic fluctuations, but rather is based on the market values on the last day of the plan year. Segal is available to prepare projections of potential outcomes of market conditions and other demographic experience upon request.
- **Understanding risk:** Since the actuarial valuation results are dependent on a given set of assumptions, there is a risk that emerging results may differ significantly as actual experience proves to be different from the assumptions. A more detailed assessment of the risks would provide the Board with a better understanding of the inherent risks in the Fund. This assessment may include scenario testing, sensitivity testing, stress testing and stochastic modeling.
- We have not been engaged to perform a detailed analysis of the potential range of the impact of risk relative to the Fund's future financial condition, but have included a brief discussion of some risks that may affect the Fund in Section 2.

Important information about actuarial valuations

An actuarial valuation is a budgeting tool with respect to the financing of future projected obligations of a pension plan. It is an estimated forecast – the actual long-term cost of the plan will be determined by the actual benefits and expenses paid and the actual investment experience of the plan.

In order to prepare a valuation, Segal relies on a number of input items. These include:

Input Item	Description
Plan provisions	Plan provisions define the rules that will be used to determine benefit payments, and those rules, or the interpretation of them, may change over time. Even where they appear precise, outside factors may change how they operate. It is important to keep Segal informed with respect to plan provisions and administrative procedures, and to review the plan summary included in our report to confirm that Segal has correctly interpreted the plan of benefits.
Participant information	An actuarial valuation for a plan is based on data provided to the actuary by the plan administrator. Segal does not audit such data for completeness or accuracy, other than reviewing it for obvious inconsistencies compared to prior data and other information that appears unreasonable. It is important for Segal to receive the best possible data and to be informed about any known incomplete or inaccurate data.
Financial information	Part of the cost of a plan will be paid from existing assets — the balance will need to come from future contributions and investment income. The valuation is based on the asset values as of the valuation date, typically reported by the auditor. A snapshot as of a single date may not be an appropriate value for determining a single year's contribution requirement, especially in volatile markets. Plan sponsors often use an "actuarial value of assets" that differs from market value to gradually reflect year-to-year changes in the market value of assets in determining the contribution requirements.
Actuarial assumptions	In preparing an actuarial valuation, Segal starts by developing a forecast of the benefits to be paid to existing plan participants for the rest of their lives and the lives of their beneficiaries. This requires actuarial assumptions as to the probability of death, disability, withdrawal, and retirement of participants in each year, as well as forecasts of the plan's benefits for each of those events. In addition, the benefits forecasted for each of those events in each future year reflect actuarial assumptions as to salary increases and cost-of-living adjustments. The forecasted benefits are then discounted to a present value, typically based on an estimate of the rate of return that will be achieved on the plan's assets. All of these factors are uncertain and unknowable. Thus, there will be a range of reasonable assumptions, and the results may vary materially based on which assumptions are selected within that range. That is, there is no right answer (except with hindsight). It is important for any user of an actuarial valuation to understand and accept this constraint. The actuarial model may use approximations and estimates that will have an immaterial impact on our results. In addition, the actuarial assumptions may change over time, and while this can have a significant impact on the reported results, it does not mean that the previous assumptions or results were unreasonable or wrong.

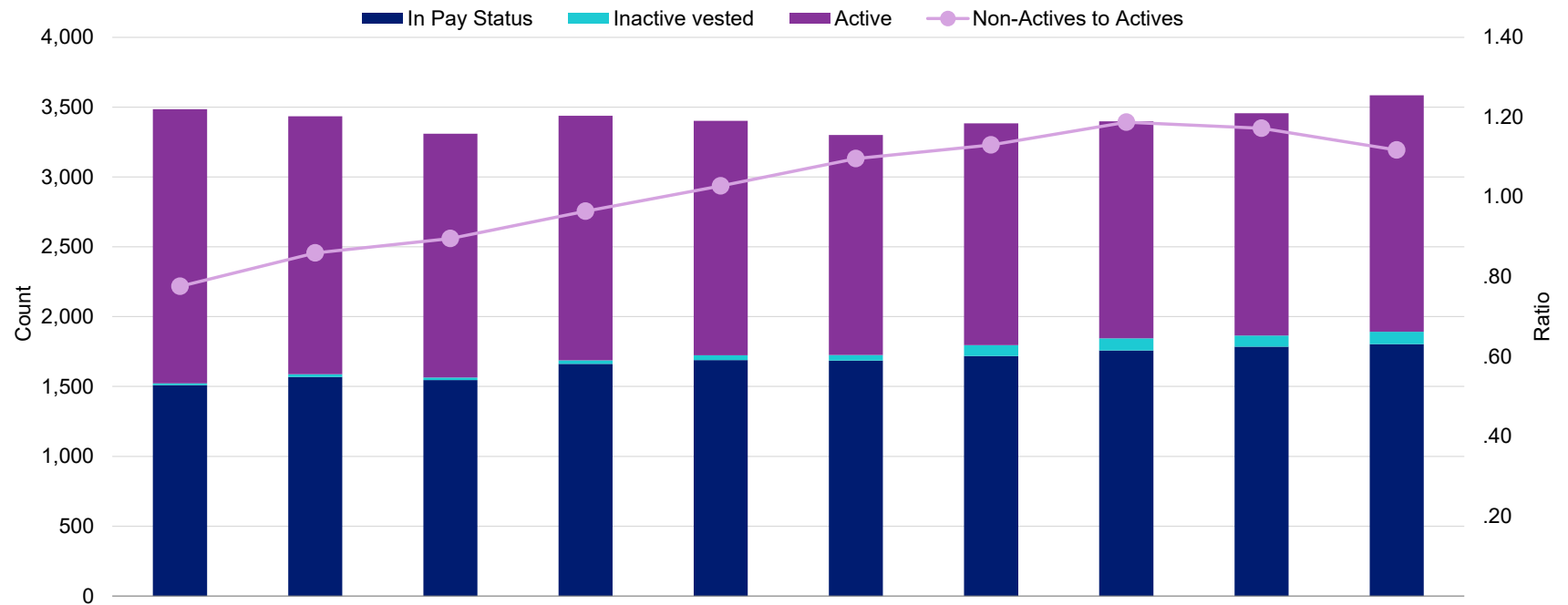
The user of Segal's actuarial valuation (or other actuarial calculations) should keep the following in mind:

- An actuarial valuation is a measurement at a specific date — it is not a prediction of a plan's future financial condition. Accordingly, Segal did not perform an analysis of the potential range of financial measurements, except where otherwise noted.
- If the Board is aware of any event or trend that was not considered in this valuation that may materially change the results of the valuation, Segal should be advised, so that we can evaluate it.
- Segal does not provide investment, legal, accounting, or tax advice and is not acting as a fiduciary to the Fund. The valuation is based on Segal's understanding of applicable guidance in these areas and of the Fund's provisions, but they may be subject to alternative interpretations. The Board should look to their other advisors for expertise in these areas.
- While Segal maintains extensive quality assurance procedures, an actuarial valuation involves complex computer models and numerous inputs. In the event that an inaccuracy is discovered after presentation of Segal's valuation, Segal may revise that valuation or make an appropriate adjustment in the next valuation.
- Segal's report shall be deemed to be final and accepted by the Board upon delivery and review. Trustees should notify Segal immediately of any questions or concerns about the final content.

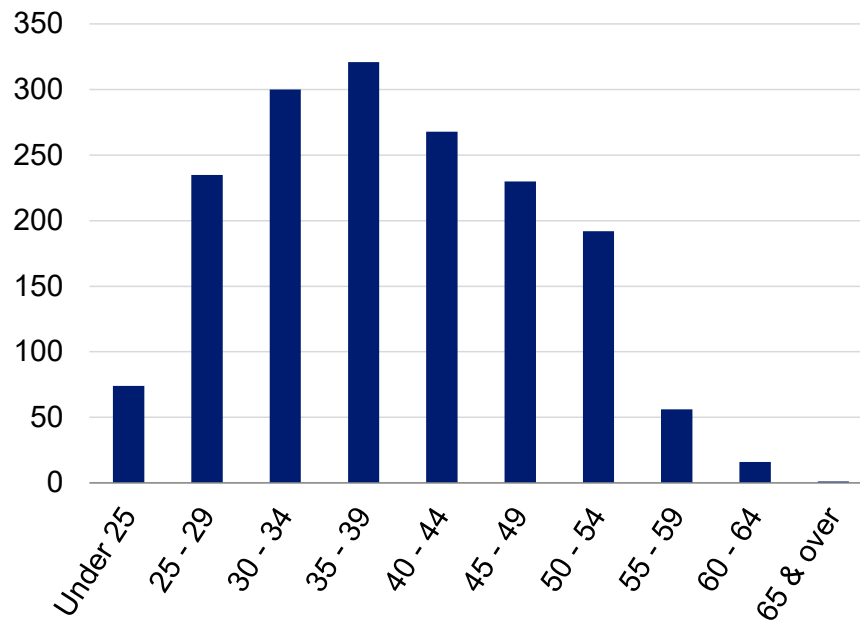

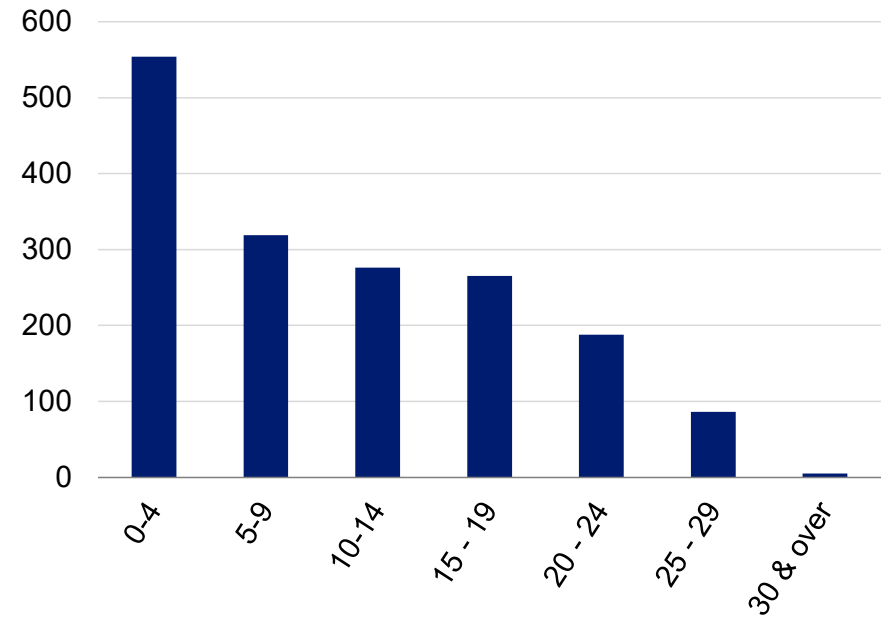

In addition, there were 506 inactive participants entitled to a return of their employee contributions.

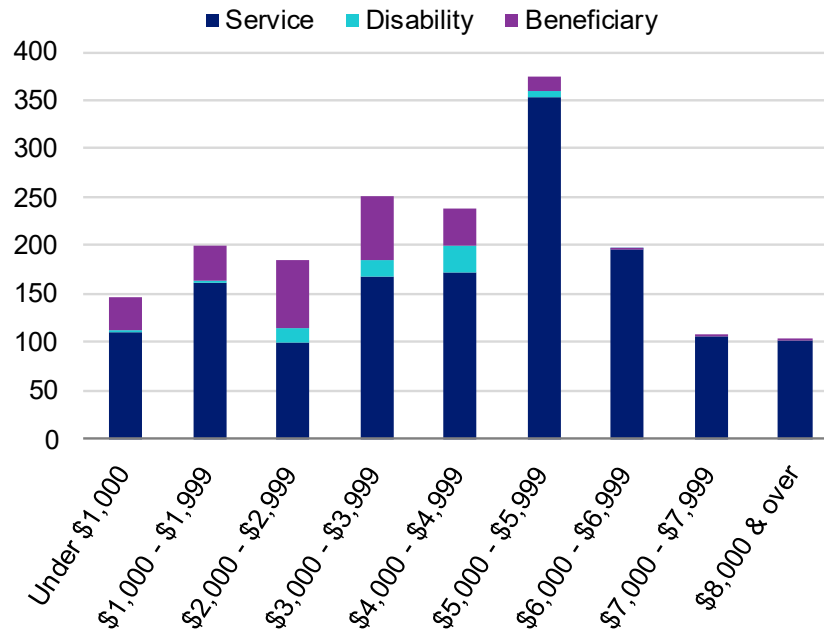

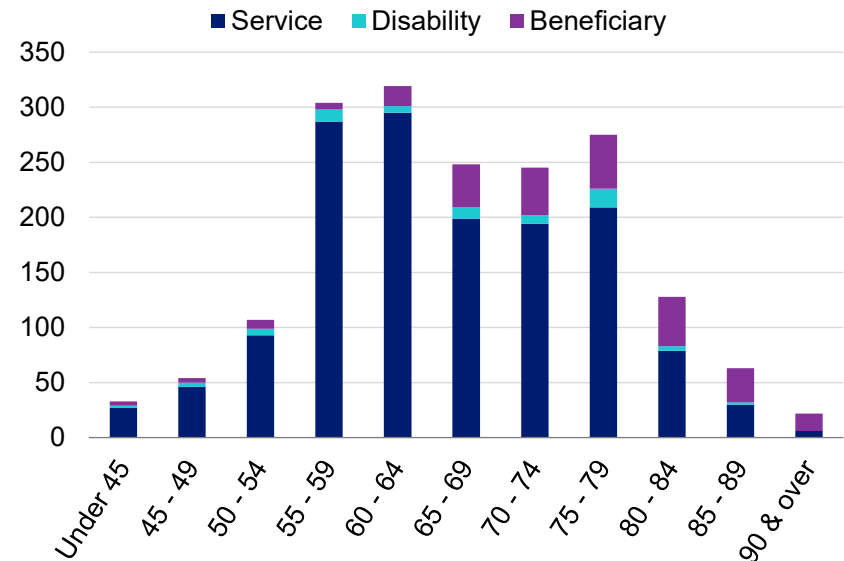

By Type and Age

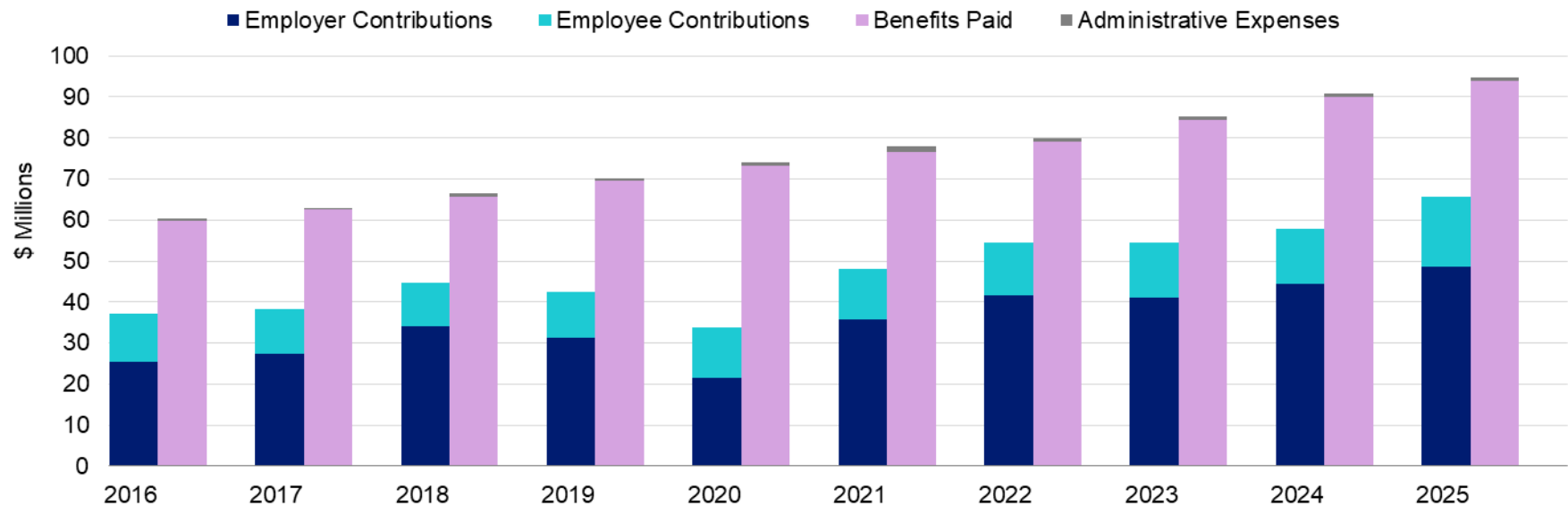

Financial information

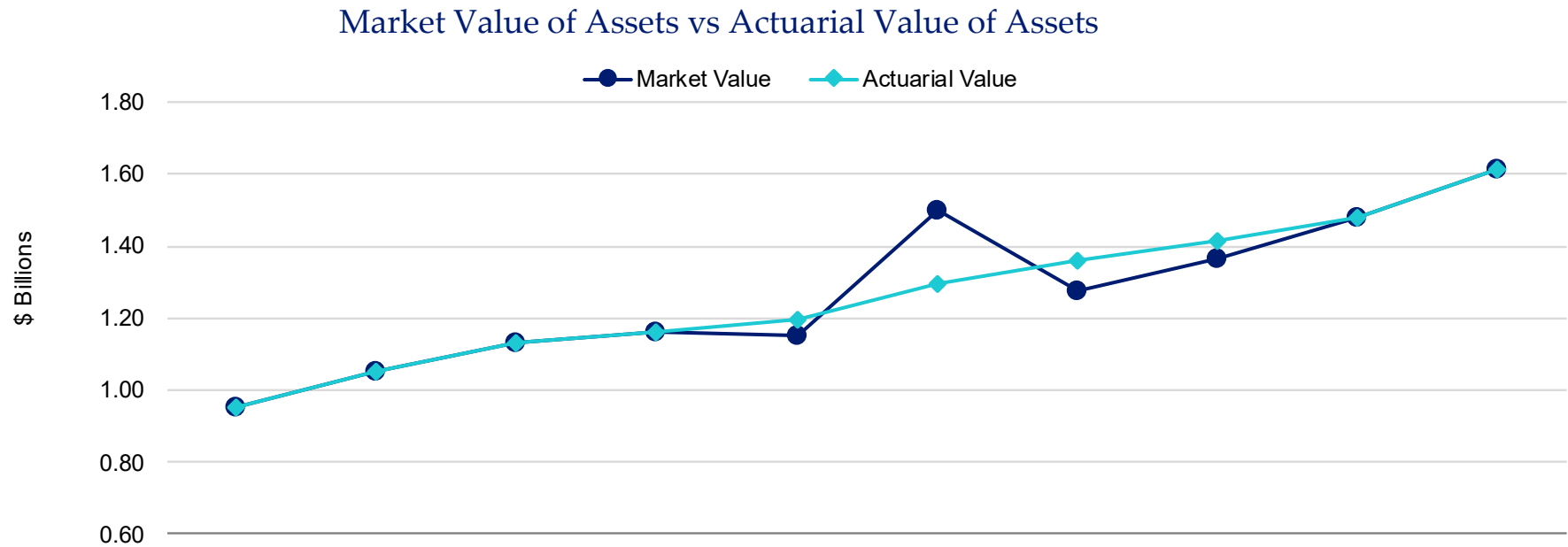

Asset history for years ended June 30



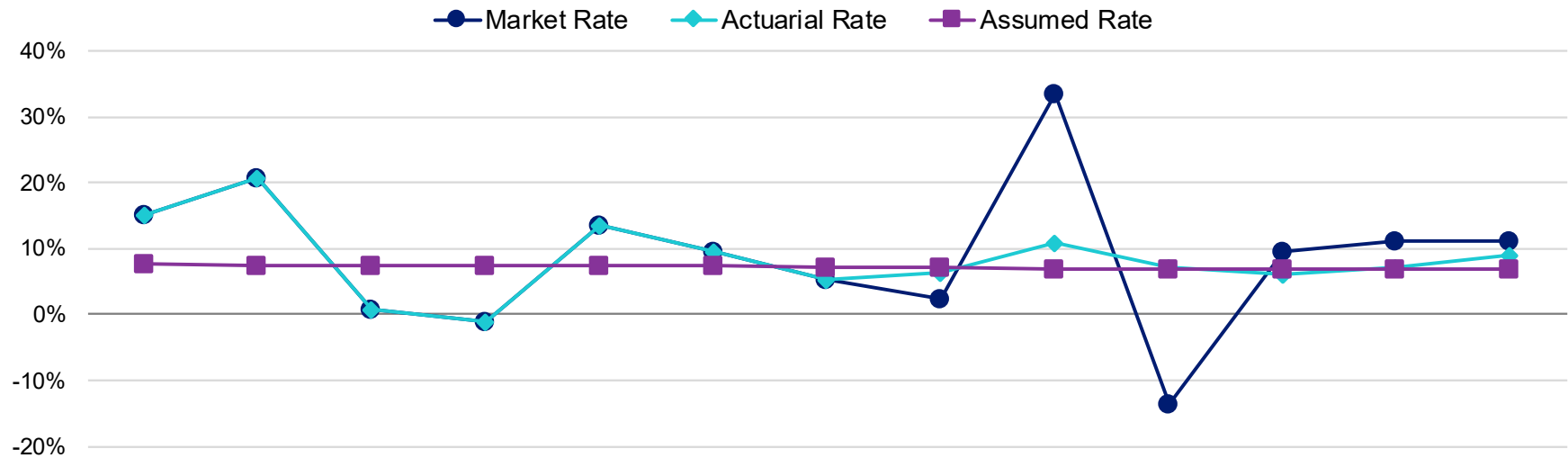

Actuarial experience

Assumptions should consider experience and should be based on reasonable expectations for the future.

Each year actual experience is compared to that projected by the assumptions. Differences are reflected in the actuarial valuation.

Assumptions are not changed if experience is believed to be a short-term development that will not continue over the long term. On the other hand, if experience is expected to continue, assumptions are changed.

Investment experience

Actuarial planning is long term. The obligations of a pension plan are expected to continue for the lifetime of all its participants.

The assumed long-term rate of return of 7.00% considers past experience, the asset allocation policy of the Board and future expectations.

Non-investment experience

Administrative expenses

Administrative expenses for the year ended June 30, 2025 totaled \$892,000, as compared to the prior year assumption of \$765,158. This resulted in an experience loss of \$103,973 for the year, including an adjustment for interest. To reflect recent experience, effective July 1, 2025, the administrative expense assumption was updated to \$850,000, with annual 2.50% inflationary increases.

Other experience

There are other differences between the expected and the actual experience that appear when the new valuation is compared with the projections from the previous valuation. These include:

- Mortality experience (more or fewer than expected deaths)
- The extent of turnover among participants
- Retirement experience (earlier or later than projected)
- The number of disability retirements (more or fewer than projected)
- Salary increases (greater or smaller than projected), and
- Inflationary cost-of-living adjustments higher or lower than anticipated.

The net loss from this other experience for the year ended June 30, 2025 amounted to \$22,252,709, which is 1.2% of the actuarial accrued liability. This year's loss is mainly due to new entrants, salary increases higher than anticipated for active participants, and cost-of-living adjustments higher than anticipated for participants and their beneficiaries in pay status who were hired prior to September 1, 2011. Beginning with this valuation, the COLA assumption for current and future retirees and their beneficiaries who were hired prior to September 1, 2011 was increased from 2.25% compounded annually to 3.00% compounded annually through December 31, 2034, followed by 2.75% compounded annually thereafter, with the COLA commencing after retirement.

Actuarial assumptions and methods

The following assumptions and methods reflected in this report were changed based on an experience study for the five-year period ended June 20, 2024:

- The administrative expense assumption was changed from \$700,000 per year beginning in 2020, projected annually with 2.25% inflation, to \$850,000 per year beginning in 2025, projected annually with 2.50% inflation.
- The salary increase assumption rates were decreased for ages below age 25 from 10.00% to 8.00%.
- The COLA assumption for current and future retirees and their beneficiaries who were hired prior to September 1, 2011 was increased from 2.25% compounded annually to 3.00% compounded annually through December 31, 2034, followed by 2.75% compounded annually thereafter, with the COLA commencing after retirement.
- The inflation assumption was increased from 2.25% per annum to 2.50% per annum.
- The payroll growth assumption was increased from 3.00% per annum to 3.50% per annum.
- The mortality tables for all participants were changed from the sex-distinct Pub-2010 Public Safety Amount-Weighted Mortality Tables to the sex-distinct Pub-2016 Public Safety Amount-Weighted Mortality Tables.
- Future mortality improvement was changed from projecting generationally from 2010 with the sex-distinct improvement rates under the SOA MP-2020 Scale to projecting generationally from 2016 with the sex-distinct improvement rates under the SOA 2024 Adjusted MP-2021 Scale.
- The disability rates were changed from 25% of the sex-distinct rates from Class 4 of the Wyatt 1985 Disability Study to 20% of the sex-distinct rates from Class 4 of the Wyatt 1985 Disability Study.
- The amount-weighted, age-based turnover rates were increased for ages 25 to 57 and decreased for ages below age 25. The previous rates are shown in Section 4, Exhibit I of the July 1, 2024 valuation report.
- The retirement rates for participants with less than 30 years of service were updated for several ages. The previous rates are shown in Section 4, Exhibit I of the July 1, 2024 valuation report.
- The retirement age for current inactive participants was changed from age 60 to benefit commencement age provided by plan administrator, or if unavailable, age 55 if hired prior to September 1, 2011 and age 57 if hired after August 31, 2011.
- The assumption for the percentage of terminated vested participants who elect a refund of employee contributions was changed from 95% to 90%.
- The actuarial value of assets was reset equal to market value as of July 1, 2025. Beginning July 1, 2026, actuarial value of assets will be market value of assets less unrecognized returns in each of the last five years. Unrecognized return is equal to the

difference between the actual market return and the expected return on the market value, and is recognized over a five-year period, further adjusted, if necessary, to be within 20% of the market value.

The changes increased the actuarial accrued liability by 6.7%, the ADC by 10.9%, and decreased the employer normal cost by 10.7%. The changes decreased the funded percentage using the actuarial value of assets (including the reset to market value) by 3.57% from 81.89% to 78.32%. Details on actuarial assumptions and methods are in Section 4, Exhibit G.

Plan provisions

There were no changes in plan provisions since the prior valuation.

Unfunded actuarial accrued liability

Actuarially determined contribution

The actuarially determined contribution is equal to the employer normal cost payment and a payment on the unfunded/ actuarial accrued liability. As of July 1, 2025, the actuarially determined contribution is \$55,091,884, or 35.27% of projected payroll.

The City specifies the funding policy used to calculate the actuarially determined contribution based on a closed amortization period of 30 years, established with the July 1, 2011 valuation. As of July 1, 2025, there are 16 years remaining on this schedule. The 2025 and 2024 ADC amounts shown in the chart are payable for the fiscal years ending June 30, 2027 and June 20, 2026, respectively.

The funding policy adopted by the City is designed to reduce the volatility of the actuarially determined contribution by using an actuarial value of assets which smooths investment gains and losses over five years. Effective July 1, 2025, the actuarial value of was reset to market value.

Based on the current funding policy the actuarially determined contribution is expected to remain level as a percent of payroll and the funded ratio is expected to increase until it reaches 100% in 16 years.

Therefore, the unfunded actuarial accrued liability is expected to be fully amortized by June 20, 2042, assuming all assumptions are realized and contributions are made in accordance with the funding policy.

The current funding policy is intended to result in predictable employer contributions that eliminate the unfunded actuarial accrued liability within 16 years, thereby providing benefit security to plan participants while balancing the needs of current and future contributors to the plan.

The actuarially determined contribution under the funding policy is a “Reasonable Actuarially Determined Contribution” as required under Actuarial Standard of Practice No. 4 *Measuring Pension Obligations and Determining Pension Plan Costs or Contributions*.

Low-Default-Risk Obligation Measure (LDROM)

Actuarial Standard of Practice No. 4 (ASOP 4) *Measuring Pension Obligations and Determining Pension Plan Costs or Contributions*. requires the disclosure of a Low-Default-Risk Obligation Measure (LDROM) when performing a funding valuation. The LDROM presented in this report is calculated using the same methodology and assumptions used to determine the Actuarial Accrued Liability (AAL) used for funding, except for the discount rate. The LDROM is required to be calculated using “a discount rate...derived from low-default-risk fixed income securities whose cash flows are reasonably consistent with the pattern of benefits expected to be paid in the future.”

The LDROM is a calculation assuming a plan’s assets are invested in an all-bond portfolio, generally lowering expected long-term investment returns. The discount rate selected and used for this purpose is the Bond Buyer General Obligation 20-year Municipal Bond Index Rate, published at the end of each week. The last published rate in December of the measurement period, by The Bond Buyer (www.bondbuyer.com), is 5.20% for use effective June 30, 2025. This is the rate used to determine the discount rate for valuing reported public pension plan liabilities in accordance with Governmental Accounting Standards when plan assets are projected to be insufficient to make projected benefit payments, and the 20-year period reasonably approximates the duration of plan liabilities. The LDROM is not used to determine a plan’s funded status or Actuarially Determined Contribution. The plan’s expected return on assets, currently 7.00%, is used for these calculations.

As of June 30, 2025, the LDROM for the system is \$2,627,285,220. The difference between the plan’s AAL of \$2,061,888,092 and the LDROM can be thought of as the increase in the AAL if the entire portfolio were invested in low-default-risk securities. Alternatively, this difference could also be viewed as representing the expected savings from investing in the plan’s diversified portfolio compared to investing only in low-default-risk securities.

ASOP 4 requires commentary to help the intended user understand the significance of the LDROM with respect to the funded status of the plan, plan contributions, and the security of participant benefits. In general, if plan assets were invested exclusively in low-default-risk securities, the funded status would be lower and the Actuarially Determined Contribution would be higher. While investing in a portfolio with low-default-risk securities may be more likely to reduce investment volatility and the volatility of employer contributions, it also may be more likely to result in higher employer contributions or lower benefits.

Risk

The actuarial valuation results are dependent on a single set of assumptions; however, there is a risk that emerging results may differ significantly as actual experience proves to be different from the current assumptions.

We have not been engaged to perform a detailed analysis of the potential range of the impact of risk relative to the Fund's future financial condition but have included a brief discussion of some risks that may affect the Fund.

- Economic and Other Related Risks. Potential implications for the Fund due to the following economic effects (that were not reflected as of the valuation date) include:

- Volatile financial markets and investment returns lower than assumed
- High inflationary environment impacting salary increases and COLAs

- Investment Risk (the risk that returns will be different than expected)

If the actual return on market value for the prior plan year were 1% different (either higher or lower), the unfunded actuarial liability would change by 3.28%, or about \$14,677,440.

Since the Fund's assets are much larger than contributions, investment performance may create volatility in the actuarially determined contribution requirements. For example, for the prior plan year, if the actual return on market value were 1% different, the actuarially determined contribution would increase or decrease by \$1,245,652.

The market value rate of return over the last 13 years has ranged from a low of -13.49% to a high of 33.56%.

- Longevity Risk (the risk that mortality experience will be different than expected)

The actuarial valuation includes an expectation of future improvement in life expectancy. Emerging plan experience that does not match these expectations will result in either an increase or decrease in the actuarially determined contribution.

- Contribution Risk (the risk that actual contributions will be different from actuarially determined contribution)

The City's funding policy requires payment of the actuarially determined contribution. As long as this policy is adhered to, contribution risk is negligible.

- Demographic Risk (the risk that participant experience will be different than assumed)

Examples of this risk include:

- Actual retirements occurring earlier or later than assumed. The value of retirement plan benefits is sensitive to the rate of benefit accruals and any early retirement subsidies that apply.
- More or less active participant turnover than assumed.

- There are external factors including legislative or financial reporting changes that could impact the Fund's funding and disclosure requirements. While we do not assume any changes in such external factors, it is important to understand that they could have significant consequences for the Fund.

- Actual Experience Over the Last Ten Years

Past experience can help demonstrate the sensitivity of key results to the Fund's actual experience. Over the past ten years:

- The funded percentage on the actuarial value of assets has ranged from a low of 73.10% in 2016 to a high of 87.12% in 2018.
- The funded percentage on the market value of assets has ranged from a low of 71.72% in 2022 to a high of 89.34% in 2021.

Maturity Measures

- As pension plans mature, the cash needed to fulfill benefit obligations will increase over time. Therefore, cash flow projections and analysis should be performed to assure that the Fund's asset allocation is aligned to meet emerging pension liabilities.
- Currently the Fund has a non-active to active participant ratio of 1.12.
- For the prior year, benefits paid and administrative expenses were \$29,058,000 more than contributions received. Plans with high levels of negative cash flows may have a need for a larger allocation to income-generating assets, which can create a drag on investment return.

Detailed Risk Assessment

- A more detailed assessment of the risks would provide the Board with a better understanding of the risks inherent in the Fund. This assessment may include scenario testing, sensitivity testing, stress testing, and stochastic modeling.
- A detailed risk assessment could be important for the Fund because:
 - Relatively small changes in investment performance can produce large swings in the unfunded liabilities.
 - The Plan's asset allocation has potential for a significant amount of investment return volatility.
 - Retirees and beneficiaries account for 66% of Fund's liabilities, leaving limited options for reducing plan costs in the event of adverse experience.
 - Recent changes in the plan of benefits may result in participant choices that vary from those assumed.
 - The Board has not had a detailed risk assessment in recent years.

GFOA funded liability by type

The Actuarial Accrued Liability represents the present value of benefits earned, calculated using the Pension Fund's actuarial cost method. The Actuarial Value of Assets reflects the financial resources available to liquidate the liability. The portion of the liability covered by assets reflects the extent to which accumulated plan assets are sufficient to pay future benefits, and is shown for liabilities associated with employee contributions, pensioner liabilities, and other liabilities. The Government Finance Officers Association (GFOA) recommends that the funding policy aim to achieve a funded ratio of 100 percent.

Actuarial balance sheet

An overview of the Pension Fund's funding is given by an Actuarial Balance Sheet. In this approach, first the amount and timing of all future payments that will be made by the Pension Fund for current participants is determined. Then these payments are discounted at the valuation interest rate to the date of the valuation, thereby determining the present value, referred to as the "liability" of the Pension Fund.

Second, this liability is compared to the assets. The "assets" for this purpose include the net amount of assets already accumulated by the Pension Fund, the present value of future member contributions, the present value of future employer normal cost contributions, and the present value of future employer amortization payments for the unfunded actuarial accrued liability.

State minimum requirements

Under Georgia minimum funding requirements, the liability may be amortized as a percent of payroll, rather than a fixed dollar amount. In general, with fixed dollar amortization, actual experience close to the assumptions will result in a total contribution requirement (the normal cost plus the payment on the unfunded actuarial liability) that decreases over time as a percentage of payroll. With percentage of payroll amortization, given expected experience, the total contribution requirement should remain level as a percentage of payroll.

Effective with the July 1, 2011 valuation, the amortization period was changed to a closed 30-year period, with 16 years remaining as of July 1, 2025. The contributions determined under this method meet the Georgia minimum funding requirements by virtue of Georgia Code Section 47-20-10(b).

Exhibit E: Determination of Actuarial Value of Assets

It is desirable to have level and predictable plan costs from one year to the next. For this reason, the Board has approved an asset valuation method that gradually adjusts to market value. Under this valuation method, the full value of market fluctuations is not recognized in a single year and, as a result, the asset value and the plan costs are more stable. The amount of the adjustment to recognize market value is treated as income, which may be positive or negative. Realized and unrealized gains and losses are treated equally and, therefore, the sale of assets has no immediate effect on the actuarial value. Effective with this valuation, the actuarial value of assets was reset to market value.

The information and analysis used in selecting methods and each economic demographic assumption that has a significant effect on this actuarial valuation is shown in the Review of Actuarial Experience for the five-year period ended June 30, 2024 dated January 21, 2026.

7.00%. The net investment return assumption is a long-term estimate derived from historical data, current and recent market expectations, and professional judgment. As part of the analysis, a building block approach was used that reflects inflation expectations and anticipated risk premiums for each of the portfolio's asset classes as provided by Marquette and Segal Marco Advisors, as well as the Fund's target asset allocation.

Models

Segal valuation results are based on proprietary actuarial modeling software. The actuarial valuation models generate a comprehensive set of liability and cost calculations that are presented to meet regulatory, legislative and client requirements. Our Actuarial Technology and Systems unit, comprised of both actuaries and programmers, is responsible for the initial development and maintenance of these models. The models have a modular structure that allows for a high degree of accuracy, flexibility and user control. The client team programs the assumptions and the plan provisions, validates the models, and reviews test lives and results, under the supervision of the responsible actuary.

Justification for change in actuarial assumptions

The following assumptions and methods were changed based on an actuarial experience study for the five-year period ended June 30, 2024 dated January 21, 2021.

- The administrative expense assumption was changed from \$700,000 per year beginning in 2020, projected annually with 2.25% inflation, to \$850,000 per year beginning in 2025, projected annually with 2.50% inflation.
- The salary increase assumption rates were decreased for ages below age 25 from 10.00% to 8.00%.
- The cost-of-living assumption for those hired prior to September 1, 2011 was increased from 2.25% to 3.00% compounded annually through December 31, 2034, followed by 2.75% compounded annually thereafter, with the COLA commencing after retirement.
- The inflation assumption was increased from 2.25% to 2.50%.
- The payroll growth assumption was increased from 3.00% per annum to 3.50% per annum.
- The mortality tables for all participants were changed from the sex-distinct Pub-2010 Public Safety Amount-Weighted Mortality Tables to the sex-distinct Pub-2016 Public Safety Amount-Weighted Mortality Tables.
- Future mortality improvement was changed from projecting generationally from 2010 with the sex-distinct improvement rates under the SOA MP-2020 Scale to projecting generationally from 2016 with the sex-distinct improvement rates under the SOA 2024 Adjusted MP-2021 Scale.
- The disability rates were changed from 25% of the sex-distinct rates from Class 4 of the Wyatt 1985 Disability Study to 20% of the sex-distinct rates from Class 4 of the Wyatt 1985 Disability Study.
- The amount-weighted, age-based turnover rates were increased for ages 25 through 57 and decreased for ages under age 25. The previous rates are shown in Section 4, Exhibit I of the July 1, 2024 valuation report

- The retirement rates for participants with less than 30 years of service were updated for several ages. The previous rates are shown in Section 4, Exhibit I of the July 1, 2024 valuation report.
- The retirement age for current inactive participants was changed from age 60 to benefit commencement age provided by plan administrator, or, if unavailable, age 55 if hired prior to September 1, 2011, and age 57 if hired after August 31, 2011.
- The assumption for the percentage of terminated vested participants who elect a refund of employee contributions was changed from 95% to 90%.
- The actuarial value of assets was reset to market value as of July 1, 2025. Beginning July 1, 2026, actuarial value of assets will be market value of assets less unrecognized returns in each of the last five years. Unrecognized return is equal to the difference between the actual market return and the expected return on the market value, and is recognized over a five-year period, further adjusted, if necessary, to be within 20% of the market value.

There have been no other changes in actuarial assumptions or methods since the last valuation.

Appendix A: Definition of Pension Terms

The following list defines certain technical terms for the convenience of the reader:

Actuarial cost method	A procedure allocating the Actuarial Present Value of Future Benefits to various time periods; a method used to determine the Normal Cost and the Actuarial Accrued Liability that are used to determine the actuarially determined contribution.
Actuarial gain or loss	A measure of the difference between actual experience and that expected based upon a set of Actuarial Assumptions, during the period between two Actuarial Valuation dates. To the extent that actual experience differs from that assumed, Actuarial Accrued Liabilities emerge which may be the same as forecasted or may be larger or smaller than projected. Actuarial gains are due to favorable experience, e.g., assets earn more than projected, salary increases are less than assumed, members retire later than assumed, etc. Favorable experience means actual results produce actuarial liabilities not as large as projected by the actuarial assumptions. On the other hand, actuarial losses are the result of unfavorable experience, i.e., actual results yield actuarial liabilities that are larger than projected.
Actuarially equivalent	Of equal Actuarial Present Value, determined as of a given date and based on a given set of Actuarial Assumptions.
Actuarial present value	The value of an amount or series of amounts payable or receivable at various times, determined as of a given date by the application of a particular set of Actuarial Assumptions. Each such amount or series of amounts is: Adjusted for the probable financial effect of certain intervening events (such as changes in compensation levels, marital status, etc.) Multiplied by the probability of the occurrence of an event (such as survival, death, disability, withdrawal, etc.) on which the payment is conditioned, and Discounted according to an assumed rate (or rates) of return to reflect the time value of money.

Actuarial valuation	The determination, as of a valuation date, of the Normal Cost, Actuarial Accrued Liability, Actuarial Value of Assets, and related Actuarial Present Values for a plan, as well as Actuarially Determined Contributions.
Actuarial value of assets	The value of the Plan's assets as of a given date, used by the actuary for valuation purposes. This may be the market or fair value of plan assets, but commonly plans use a smoothed value in order to reduce the year-to-year volatility of calculated results, such as the funded ratio and the Actuarially Determined Contribution.
Actuarially determined	Values that have been determined utilizing the principles of actuarial science. An actuarially determined value is derived by application of the appropriate actuarial assumptions to specified values determined by provisions of the Plan.
Actuarially determined contribution	The employer's contributions, expressed as a dollar amount or a percentage of covered plan compensation, determined under the Fund's funding policy. The ADC consists of the Employer Normal Cost and the Amortization Payment.
Amortization method	A method for determining the Amortization Payment. The most common methods used are level dollar and level percentage of payroll. Under the Level Dollar method, the Amortization Payment is one of a stream of payments, all equal, whose Actuarial Present Value is equal to the Unfunded Actuarial Accrued Liability. Under the Level Percentage of Pay method, the Amortization Payment is one of a stream of increasing payments, whose Actuarial Present Value is equal to the Unfunded Actuarial Accrued Liability. Under the Level Percentage of Pay method, the stream of payments increases at the assumed rate at which total covered payroll of all active members will increase.
Amortization payment	The portion of the pension plan contribution, or ADC, that is intended to pay off the Unfunded Actuarial Accrued Liability.

Closed amortization period	A specific number of years that is counted down by one each year, and therefore declines to zero with the passage of time. For example, if the amortization period is initially set at 20 years, it is 19 years at the end of one year, 18 years at the end of two years, etc. See Open Amortization Period.
Decrements	Those causes/events due to which a member's status (active-inactive-retiree-beneficiary) changes, that is: death, retirement, disability, or withdrawal.
Defined benefit plan	A retirement plan in which benefits are defined by a formula based on the member's compensation, age and/or years of service.
Defined contribution plan	A retirement plan, such as a 401(k) plan, a 403(b) plan, or a 457 plan, in which the contributions to the plan are assigned to an account for each member, the plan's earnings are allocated to each account, and each member's benefits are a direct function of the account balance.
Employer normal cost	The portion of the Normal Cost to be paid by the employer. This is equal to the Normal Cost less expected member contributions.
Experience study	A periodic review and analysis of the actual experience of the Plan that may lead to a revision of one or more actuarial assumptions. Actual rates of decrement and salary increases are compared to the actuarially assumed values and modified based on recommendations from the Actuary.
Funded ratio	The ratio of the Actuarial Value of Assets (AVA) to the Actuarial Accrued Liability (AAL). Plans sometimes also calculate a market funded ratio, using the Market Value of Assets (MVA), rather than the AVA.
GASB 67 and GASB 68	Governmental Accounting Standards Board (GASB) Statements No. 67 and No. 68. These are the governmental accounting standards that set the accounting rules for public retirement systems and the employers that sponsor or contribute to them. Statement No. 68 sets the accounting rules for the employers that sponsor or contribute to public retirement systems, while Statement No. 67 sets the rules for the systems themselves.

Appendix A: Definition of Pension Terms

Term	Definition
Investment return	The rate of earnings of the Pension Fund from its investments, including interest, dividends and capital gain and loss adjustments, computed as a percentage of the average value of the fund. For actuarial purposes, the investment return often reflects a smoothing of the capital gains and losses to avoid significant swings in the value of assets from one year to the next.
Net Pension Liability (NPL)	The Net Pension Liability is equal to the Total Pension Liability minus the Plan Fiduciary Net Position.
Normal cost	The portion of the Actuarial Present Value of Future Benefits and expenses, if applicable, allocated to a valuation year by the Actuarial Cost Method. Any payment with respect to an Unfunded Actuarial Accrued Liability is not part of the Normal Cost (see Amortization Payment). For pension plan benefits that are provided in part by employee contributions, Normal Cost refers to the total of member contributions and employer Normal Cost unless otherwise specifically stated.
Open amortization period	An open amortization period is one which is used to determine the Amortization Payment but which does not change over time. If the initial period is set as 30 years, the same 30-year period is used in each future year in determining the Amortization Period.
Plan Fiduciary Net Position	Market value of assets.
Service costs	The portions of the actuarial present value of projected benefit payments that are attributed to valuation years.
Total Pension Liability (TPL)	The actuarial accrued liability under the entry age normal cost method and based on the blended discount rate as described in GASB 67 and 68.
Unfunded actuarial accrued liability	The excess of the Actuarial Accrued Liability over the Actuarial Value of Assets. This value may be negative, in which case it may be expressed as a negative Unfunded Actuarial Accrued Liability, also called the Funding Surplus or an Overfunded Actuarial Accrued Liability.
Valuation date or actuarial valuation date	The date as of which the value of assets is determined and as of which the Actuarial Present Value of Future Benefits is determined. The expected benefits to be paid in the future are discounted to this date.
